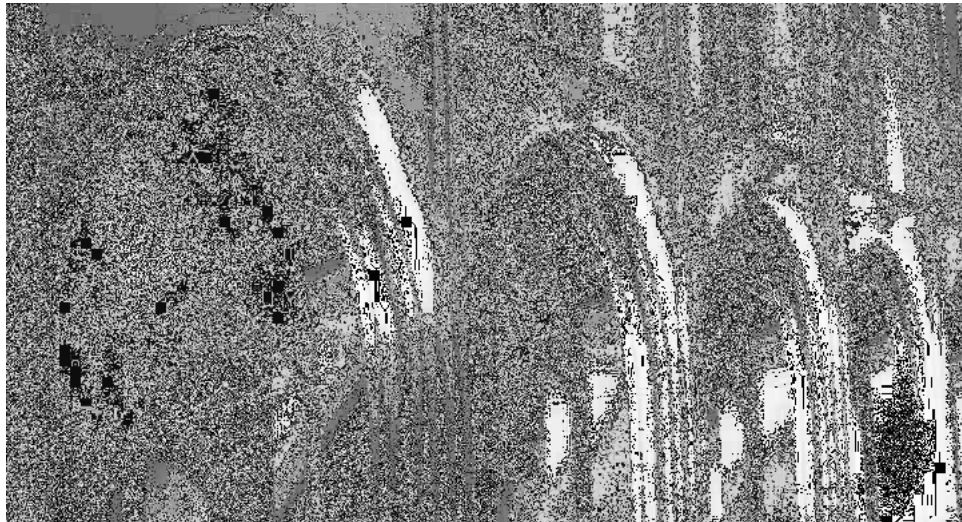

**A READING FROM THE BOOK OF
ACTS**

In those days Peter stood up among
the believers (together the crowd
numbered about one hundred

twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus - for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us - one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth."

This Morning's Music

It is interesting that on a Sunday where we pay tribute to the memory of Florence Trynor and the ongoing work of the Gordon Group, compositions of two extraordinarily gifted female composers will be sung.

A graduate of the music program at Queen's University, Eleanor Daley is rightly regarded as one of Canada's best known church music composers. She has been the director of music at Toronto's Fairlawn Heights United Church since 1982. Our gradual's text was written by Charles Wesley in 1740. He uses the Transfiguration image of outward light as a metaphor to kindle our inner light and thereby "scatter all [our] unbelief."

Our offertory hymn, "Come Celebrate the Women," is by Shirley Erena Murray who was born in Invercargill, New Zealand. The wide-ranging subject matter of her texts, including the sacraments, inclusiveness, the liturgical year, non-violence, personal faith, social justice, and ecology, has resulted in her hymns being included in more than 100 collections from all over the world. Prior to her achievements as a hymn writer, Murray was a teacher and produced hymn programs on radio. Her middle name is derived from the Greek word for peace (*eirene*), and peace and peace-making are prominent themes in her texts. In 2001 Murray was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit on the occasion of the Queen's birthday "for services to the community as a writer of hymns," the first New Zealand hymn writer so honored.

The text of our communion hymn is also by a woman, Francis Wheeler Davis. Verse 4, as is our practice, will be sung unaccompanied. This is one of the best known Canadian hymns and

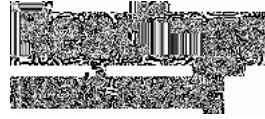
Honouring the Gordon Group. Remembering Florence Trynor

New handbook promotes care for military families Ali Symons Anglican Church of Canada

How do churches pray for someone heading for Afghanistan? How can a community welcome home a parishioner injured in battle? A new resource offers answers to these questions and practical advice on how Canadian Anglican churches can care for military members and their families.

"It was meant to be a very simple and practical guide that is applicable to all parishes," said the Rev. Canon Dr. Gary Thorne, primary author of the resource. He said the handbook focuses solely on pastoral care, not the deeper psychological help that military members may need.

The handbook suggests care for people at stages of deployment, gives a background on military chaplaincy, and offers sample prayers.

Mr. Thorne noted that these resources are useful to all parishes, regardless of their opinions on the particular mission, or war in general. The Anglican Church of Canada does not have one stance on these topics. Within recent years, Canadian Anglicans have spoken out both in favour of pacifism and "just war" theory.

"These are intended to be guidelines for the care of soldiers and their families," said Mr. Thorne. "There are prayers that can be said at any time that Canada has troops anywhere, whether or not the parish, the rector, and parishioners are pacifists, and don't believe in war at all, whether they happen to agree with a particular mission, or whether they violently disagree with the role of Canada in a particular mission."

Some Canadian Anglican priests have chosen to walk alongside the Canadian Forces as either regular or reservist chaplains. Of the 330 chaplains in the Canadian military, 75 are Anglican ministers. Chaplains accompany military personnel on all significant operations, and can perform other tasks like receiving soldiers' remains and ministering to families of soldiers who have been killed.

As a reservist military chaplain for 19 years, Mr. Thorne has first-hand experience with these issues. In 2003, he served at the Israel-Syria border for six months during the American invasion of Iraq, where he ministered to Canadian and UN troops.

Currently Mr. Thorne serves as chaplain at the University of King's College, Halifax. He is also a member of the Faith, Worship, and Ministry Committee (which first suggested this resource), the Primate's Theological Commission and the Chapter of the Anglican Ordinariate, the body that advises the Right Rev. Peter Coffin, Anglican Bishop Ordinary to the Canadian Forces.

Looking ahead

June 7 is Vision 2019 Sunday

Dream the church VISION 2019

Trinity Sunday, June 7, is a time to think big.

All parishes are encouraged to think about the future of the Anglican Church of Canada by joining in on Vision 2019, a church-wide exercise to discern, dream, and decide where God wants the church to be by the year 2019.

Trinity Sunday is a great time to think about the future mission of the church, says Dr. Eileen Scully, General Synod's coordinator for ministry and worship. "The church is invited to participate in the life of the Trinity," she explained. "The unity of the Trinity isn't for its own sake. The love binding the persons of the Trinity spills out into creation, and this is where the church's mission comes from."

Vision 2019 is unlike past plans for the church's mission: it aims to get grass-roots input from as many Canadian Anglicans as possible. Everyone is invited to answer the two-part question "Where is your church now, and where do you want the Anglican Church of Canada to be by 2019?"

The fun part is that people can pick how to answer the question. They can

"To tell us your story is to tell us your walk of discipleship, as you're living into the Trinity," notes Ms. Scully. "Where is Jesus calling you? How is the Holy Spirit binding you together? How are you honouring the gifts of God the creator?" All responses sent in by October 1 will be analyzed by the Vision 2019 committee and a professional analyst. The team will look at the range of responses and present their findings to the whole church at General Synod 2010.
