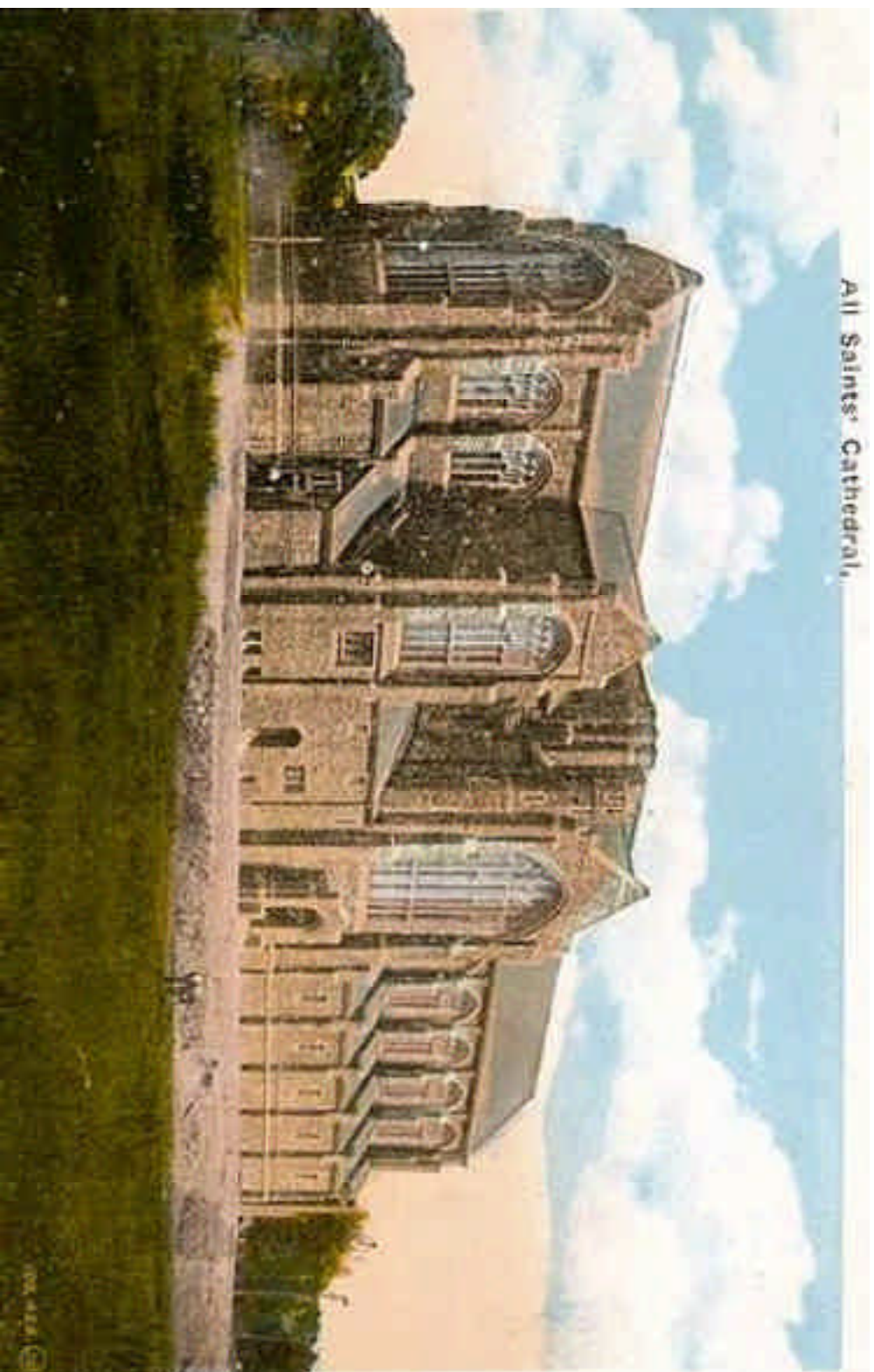

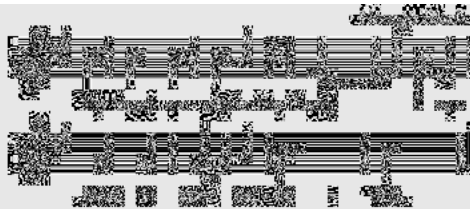

A READING FROM THE FIRST BOOK OF SAMUEL

On the day when Elkanah sacrificed, he would give portions to his wife Peninnah and to all her sons and daughters; but to Hannah he gave a double portion, because he loved her, though the Lord had closed her womb. Her rival used to provoke her severely, to irritate her, because the Lord had closed her womb. So it went on year by year; as often as she went up to the house of the Lord, she used to provoke her. Therefore Hannah wept and would not eat. Her husband Elkanah said to her, "Hannah, why do you weep? Why do you not eat? Why is your heart sad? Am I not more to you than ten sons?" After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. She made this vow: "O Lord of hosts, if only you will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head." As she continued praying before the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying silently; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard; therefore Eli thought she was drunk. So Eli said to her, "How long will you make a

drunken spectacle of yourself? Put away your wine." But Hannah answered, "No, my lord, I am a woman deeply troubled; I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the Lord. Do not regard your servant as a worthless woman, for I have been speaking out of my great anxiety and vexation all this time." Then Eli answered, "Go in peace; the God of Israel grant the petition you have made to him." And she said, "Let your servant find favour in your sight." Then the woman went to her quarters, ate and drank with her husband, and her countenance was sad no longer. They rose early in the morning and worshipped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, "I have asked him of the Lord."

A READING FROM THE LETTER TO THE HEBREWS

And every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, "he sat down at the right hand of God," and since then has been waiting "until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet." For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified. Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us con-

sider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

HEBREWS 10:11-14,19-25

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MARK

As Jesus came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, "Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!" Then Jesus asked him, "Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down." When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, "Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished?" Then Jesus began to say to them, "Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs."

This Morning's Music

The English organist and composer, Sir William Henry Harris, affectionately nicknamed "Doc H" by his choristers was born in Fulham, London and died in Petersfield. At the age of 14, he took up a position as Assistant Organist at St David's Cathedral in Wales, followed at 16 by a scholarship to the Royal College of Music where he returned as Professor of Organ and Harmony from 1921 to 1955. He was Organist successively at New College and Christ Church, Oxford, and moved to St. George's Chapel, Windsor in 1933. He is best remembered for his Anglican service music, though his main achievements were as a choir-trainer. This morning's introit foreshadows our Gospel reading with another take on the temple.

We're jumping the gun just a tad with our gradual which has always been associated with the season of Advent. Campion was a medical doctor, poet and composer and "Never Weather-Beaten Sail" is one of his best known works. The text, expressing anticipation and longing, has been used by many composers and is a classic of the genre.

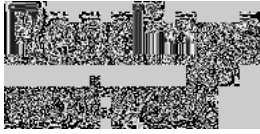
Cathedral member (and now chorister!) Alec Tilley composed our mass setting. It is a tuneful treatment of the communion service and is being sung more and more confidently by the congregation each time we schedule it. This setting is typical of Alec's work. It fits comfortably

in the vocal range and tune and text fit so very well together.

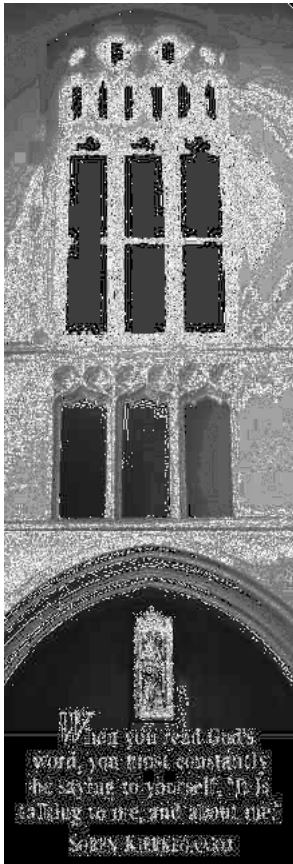
Cape Breton native Barry Peters' meditative "A Celtic Prayer," closes our service. Peters studied music at Mount Allison University and at Westminster Choir College in Princeton. He is the director of music at Richmond Hill United Church, Toronto.

Finally, a brief word on two of this morning's hymns. "God, My Hope on You Is Founded" is considered one of the quintessential hymns in the Anglican communion. The tune was written by one of the 20th century giants of Anglican church music, Herbert Howells (1892-1983), and is named for his son, Michael, who died of either cancer or meningitis when he was 9. Rarely has a marriage of text and tune been so effective. The words and music of this hymn are an inspiration to anyone who has suffered a personal loss or is in despair.

Our final hymn today, the moving "Lord, for the Years," is the result of two bishops. The Rt. Rev. Timothy Dudley-Smith (b.1926) penned the quite wonderful text (he also wrote the text of our offertory hymn) and The Rt. Rev. Michael Baughen (b.1930) composed the tune. This hymn has been selected as the "Cathedral Hymn" for our 2010 celebrations. Sing out!

H1N1 Influenza

On April 29th Bishop Sue Moxley issued a letter to the clergy of the diocese in response to questions and concerns raised with respect to the H1N1 influenza virus. The relevance of this concern was heightened for us as many of the first reported cases here in Nova Scotia involved students of King's-Edgehill.

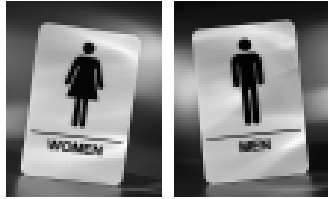
In her letter she affirms the necessity of safe practices with respect to such things as hand washing, and taking necessary precautions when coughing and sneezing.

While there has never been any evidence that sharing in the Common Cup poises significant risk to the spread of diseases, the practice of Intinction, that is dipping the host into the chalice, does present the possibility of contamination as hands and fingers are the biggest source of bacterial transfer. Therefore Intinction is in her words; "not an acceptable practice". For those who have practiced Intinction, and who do not wish to drink from the chalice, they should receive the bread only.

She concludes with this pastoral statement; "We must do what is appropriate to reduce the risk of disease, because we are about the ministry of healing. At the same time, we must continue to worship God and care for the people entrusted to our care"
