### Collect:

Creator of the fruitful earth, you made us stewards of all things. Give us grateful hearts for all your goodness, and steadfast wills to use your bounty well, that the whole human family, today and in generations to come, may with us give thanks for the riches of your creation. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ the Lord. Amen

### Prayer over the Gifts

Source of all life, the heaven and earth are yours, yet you have given us dominion over all things. Receive these symbols of our labour and love which we offer you this day, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

### Deuteronomy 8:1-20

8This entire commandment that I command you today you must diligently observe, so that you may live and increase, and go in and occupy the land that the Lord promised on oath to your ancestors. 2Remember the long way that the Lord your God has led you these forty years in the wilderness, in order to humble you, testing you to know what was in your heart, whether or not you would keep his commandments. 3He humbled you by letting you hunger, then by feeding you with manna, with which neither you nor your

ancestors were acquainted, in order to make you understand that one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord. 4The clothes on your back did not wear out and your feet did not swell these forty years. 5Know then in your heart that as a parent disciplines a child so the Lord your God disciplines you. 6Therefore keep the commandments of the Lord your God, by walking in his ways and by fearing him. 7For the Lord your God is bringing you into a good land, a land with flowing streams, with springs and underground waters welling up in valleys and hills, 8a land of wheat and barley, of vines and fig trees and pomegranates, a land of olive trees and honey, 9a land where you may eat bread without scarcity, where you will lack nothing, a land whose stones are iron and from whose hills you may mine copper. 10You shall eat your fill and bless the Lord your God for the good land that he has given you. 11Take care that you do not forget the Lord your God, by failing to keep his commandments, his ordinances, and his statutes, which I am commanding you today. 12When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them, 13and when your herds and flocks have multiplied, and your silver and gold is multiplied, and all that you have is multiplied, 14then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, 15who led you through the great and terri-

ble wilderness, an arid wasteland with poisonous snakes and scorpions. He made water flow for you from flint rock, 16and fed you in the wilderness with manna that your ancestors did not know, to humble you and to test you, and in the end to do you good. 17Do not say to yourself, "My power and the might of my own hand have gotten me this wealth." 18But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today. 19If you do forget the Lord your God and follow other gods to serve and worship them, I solemnly warn you today that you shall surely perish. 20Like the nations that the Lord is destroying before you, so shall you perish, because you would not obey the voice of the Lord your God.

### **2 Corinthians 9:6-15**

6The point is this the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. 7Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. 8And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work. 9As it is written, "He scatters abroad, he gives to the poor; his righteousness endures forever." 10He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed

for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. 11You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God through us; 12for the rendering of this ministry not only supplies the needs of the saints but also overflows with many thanksgivings to God. 13Through the testing of this ministry you glorify God by your obedience to the confession of the gospel of Christ and by the generosity of your sharing with them and with all others, 14while they long for you and pray for you because of the surpassing grace of God that he has given you. 15Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!

**Luke 17:11-19**

11On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. 12As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, 13they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" 14When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. 15Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. 16He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. 17Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? 18Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" 19Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

**Psalm 65**

Praise is due to you, O God, in Zion; and to you shall vows be performed, you who answer prayer! To you all flesh shall come. When deeds of iniquity overwhelm us, you forgive our transgressions. Happy are those whom you choose and bring near to live in your courts. We shall be satisfied with the goodness of your house, your holy temple. By awesome deeds you answer us with deliverance, O God of our salvation; you are the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas. By your strength you established the mountains; you are girded with might. You silence the roaring of the seas, the roaring of their waves, the tumult of the peoples.

Those who live at earth's farthest bounds are awed by your signs; you make the gateways of the morning and the evening shout for joy. You visit the earth and water it, you greatly enrich it; the river of God is full of water; you provide the people with grain, for so you have prepared it. You water its furrows abundantly, settling its ridges, softening it with showers, and blessing its growth. You crown the year with your bounty; your wagon tracks overflow with richness. The pastures of the wilderness overflow, the hills gird themselves with joy, the meadows clothe themselves with flocks, the valleys deck themselves with grain, they shout and sing together for joy.

## This Morning's Music

The English composer Sir Charles H. Hubert Parry was born in Bournemouth, Hampshire and is chiefly remembered for his hymn tunes "Jerusalem," "Repton," and the anthem "I Was Glad" which was written for the coronation of Edward VII in 1911 and has been used for every coronation since. He was appointed Director of the Royal College of Music in 1894 and Professor of Music at Oxford University in 1900. He died of the Spanish 'flu in the global pandemic of 1918.

Malcolm Archer, a former Organist and Choirmaster of Norwich, Bristol, Wells and St. Paul's Cathedrals, is currently Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College. A prolific composer, Archer has more than 200 published choral works including the *Sewanee Service* which will be used at next year's General Synod service here in Halifax.

Giuseppe Ottavio Pitoni was born in Rieti, Italy and his works were all intended for liturgical use. In 1677, he was appointed *maestro di Cappella* at St Marco, Rome, a post he held for the remainder of his life. He was buried in that church.

Maurice Greene was a chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral, serving under Jeremiah Clark (composer of the famous "Prince of Denmark March"). He was later appointed organist there. He was also director

of the Chapel Royal, Professor of Music at Cambridge University, and Master of the King's Music. His anthem, "Thou Visitest the Earth," is sung by choirs around the world and is one of the anthems I most vividly remember from my days as a boy chorister here at All Saints', 10, those many years ago.

Our choral benediction is a reworking of a unison children's song written by Mary Plumstead. Plumstead was a quiet, unassuming composer who lived quite happily in her native Devon. Malcolm Archer considers "A Quiet Heart" to be "... a small gem of an anthem."

## H1N1 Influenza

On April 29<sup>th</sup> Bishop Sue Moxley issued a letter to the clergy of the diocese in response to questions and concerns raised with respect to the H1N1 influenza virus. The relevance of this concern was heightened for us as many of the first reported cases here in Nova Scotia involved students of King's-Edgehill.

In her letter she affirms the necessity of safe practices with respect to such things as hand washing, and taking necessary precautions when coughing and sneezing.

While there has never been any evidence that sharing in the Common Cup poses significant risk to the spread of diseases, the practice of Intinction, that is dipping the host into the chalice, does present the possibility of contamination as hands and fingers are the biggest source of bacterial transfer. Therefore Intinction is in her words; "not an acceptable practice". For those who have practiced Intinction, and who do not wish to drink from the chalice, they should receive the bread only.

She concludes with this pastoral statement; "We must do what is appropriate to reduce the risk of disease, because we are about the ministry of healing. At the same time, we must continue to worship God and care for the people entrusted to our care"

## **Cathedral *Sanctuary Guild* Appeal: Help Wanted**

One of the strengths of the Cathedral *Sanctuary Guild* is also its main challenge: **person power**. The *Guild* boasts 28 members and, while that number seems generous, more members are needed to ensure that all the tasks get done and current personnel do not burn out.

There are three key areas that can use more people: flowers, linens, and hangings. For the latter, the *Sanctuary Guild* could really use true “manpower” because the hangings are heavy.
